## Luke 1:67-79 (ESV): Zechariah's Blessing

Main point: God's tender mercies are with you.

Open with a short prayer, inviting God to teach us.

**Background:** This is the second ancient "advent hymn" from Luke's gospel story of Jesus' birth, according to Christian tradition:

- 1. Mary's Magnificat
- 2. Zechariah's blessing after the birth of his son, John the Baptist
- 3. the Angels' "Gloria in excelsis"
- 4. Song of Simeon

Zechariah was a temple priest and a righteous man, married to Elizabeth, a righteous woman. "But they had no child, because Elizabeth was barren and both were old." (1:7)

While doing his priestly duties in the temple one day, Zechariah gets a visit from Gabriel, who tells him that his wife Elizabeth will bear a son, the baby that will eventually become John the Baptist, whose role will be "to make ready for the Lord a people prepared." (1:17)

How do you think Zechariah reacted to this startling news??

- Didn't believe it: "How shall I know this? For I am an old man, and my wife is advanced in years." (1:18).
- Result: the angel says Zechariah will not be able to speak until the baby is born.
- And sure enough, Elizabeth gets pregnant!

## Focus of study:

Now the time came for Elizabeth to give birth, and she bore a son. <sup>58</sup> And her neighbors and relatives heard that the Lord had shown great mercy to her, and they rejoiced with her. <sup>59</sup> And on the eighth day they came to circumcise the child. And they would have called him Zechariah after his father, <sup>60</sup> but his mother answered, "No; he shall be called John." <sup>61</sup> And they said to her, "None of your relatives is called by this name." <sup>62</sup> And they made signs to his father, inquiring what he wanted him to be called. <sup>63</sup> And he asked for a writing tablet and wrote, "His name is John." And they all wondered. <sup>64</sup> And immediately his mouth was opened and his tongue loosed, and he spoke, blessing God. …

for he has visited and redeemed his people

<sup>69</sup> and has raised up a horn of salvation for us in the house of his servant David,

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>70</sup> as he spoke by the mouth of his holy prophets from of old,

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>71</sup> that we should be saved from our enemies and from the hand of all who hate us;

<sup>72</sup> to show the mercy promised to our fathers and to remember his holy covenant,

<sup>73</sup> the oath that he swore to our father Abraham, to grant us

that we, being delivered from the hand of our enemies, might serve him without fear,

in holiness and righteousness before him all our days.

<sup>76</sup> And you, child, will be called the prophet of the Most High; for you will go before the Lord to prepare his ways,

<sup>77</sup> to give knowledge of salvation to his people

in the forgiveness of their sins,

because of the tender mercy of our God, whereby the sunrise shall visit us from on high

to give light to those who sit in darkness and in the shadow of death, to guide our feet into the way of peace."

## **Questions:**

- 1. What happened? The angel's news came true: Elizabeth had a baby, and they named him John
- 2. What are the first words out of Zechariah's mouth once he can speak again?
  - a. Blessed be the Lord God
  - b. Why? "He has visited and redeemed his people" (v. 68)
- 3. Why do people come visit? What is it like when someone visits you?
  - a. They know you; they enjoy you; they love you and want to be with you; they stay with you. You enjoy their company and get to know one another better. You're not lonely or alone.
  - b. How does it feel when God visits you?
- 4. In vs. 69-75, Zechariah then recounts a lot of God's promises to the Jewish people [simply refer to these verses and points rather than delving into them too deeply]:
  - a. raised up a horn of salvation
  - b. to save us from our enemies
  - c. to show mercy and remember his covenant, starting with Abraham
  - d. to set his people apart in holiness and righteousness
- 5. Then he turns to his own baby boy, John, in verse 76. What does he say that John will be called? And what will be John's purpose?
  - a. Called the prophet of the Most High
  - b. Go before the Lord and prepare the way
  - c. Tell people about forgiveness and God's tender mercy
- 6. Let's focus on that beautiful phrase, "tender mercy" how does Zechariah continue to describe it?
  - a. v. 78-79: like sunrise, giving light to whom? To those who sit in darkness and in the shadow of death
  - b. What else does light do? "guide our feet" going where? "the way of peace."
- 7. So what is God's tender mercy like for us?
  - a. Like a sunrise; like a lighted path; like life

- b. Beautiful, gentle, sure, like the best company you ever had in your home
- c. He is with you in this way, every day.
- 8. Ask for any prayer requests for today.
- 9. Close in prayer, naming people and needs listed.
- 10. End with a song, e.g., first verse of Amazing Grace
