



Worship Service Theme: Humility
Second Sunday of Lent

Helpful Elements:
Purple table covering (Lenten Season)

Welcome: Welcome! Thank you for coming to our service today. My name is _____ and I'll be leading our worship time. Today is the second Sunday of Lent, the 40 days leading up to Easter, a time of reflecting on our humanity and God's glory. We use the color purple during Lent as the color of repentance and forgiveness. Today we'll be looking at the idea of **humility**.

Please pray with me as we open our time together.

Opening Prayer: Great and loving God, we ask that your Holy Spirit bless our time together and to refresh us with your presence. In the midst of a world full of trouble and strife, we thank you for watching over us, guiding us, and as we confess our sins, for forgiving us. Enable us to enter your presence today joyfully and reverently, and let us depart with the assurance that our sins are forgiven. Fill us, O God, with the peace that passes all understanding. Amen.

Second reading: From the fourteenth chapter of the gospel of Luke (7-11):

⁷ Jesus told a story to those who were invited [to a feast], when he noticed how people chose the places of honor. Jesus said to the people, ⁸ “When you are invited by someone to a wedding feast, do not sit down in a place of honor, because someone more distinguished than you may be invited, ⁹ and the person who invited you both will come and say to you, ‘Give your place to this person,’ and then you will begin with shame to move to the lowest place. ¹⁰ But when you are invited, go and sit in the lowest place, so that when your host comes he may say to you, ‘Friend, move up higher.’ Then you will be honored in the presence of all who sit at table with you. ¹¹ For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and he who humbles himself will be exalted.”

Interactive Homily: Let’s think a bit about humility.

- What does it mean to be a humble person?
 - Gentle, kind, considerate of others, not proud, not focused on self
 - Dictionary: “having or showing a modest or low estimate of one’s own importance”
- Jesus tells the story about a wedding feast, with the lesson that it’s better not to take the best seat for yourself, and to let the host move you to a better seat. I wonder what that would look like in everyday situations? What are proud people like? How would you describe “proud” people?
 - Arrogant, self-centered, boastful, pretentious, even rude and impolite; pretty unpleasant!
- As Jesus says, “For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled.” What does it mean when someone “exalts” himself or herself?
 - Saying they’re better than everyone else, always right, “deserving” of the best
- Christ flips that attitude on its head, saying that “those who are humble will be lifted up (exalted)”; how does that work? Does God look at our impressive accomplishments and status? What does God look at instead?
 - God sees the heart; the lowly in God’s kingdom are closer to the king!

- Often, being humble translates into simple politeness and civility. Who taught you how to be polite? What are some basic politeness instructions?
 - Always say thank you; open doors for elders; let ladies and older people take your seat; let others go first in line; don't take all the food for yourself; leave the best for someone else

Let us pray together to be reminded of the virtue of humility.

(Silent Prayer) ... Lord, hear our prayers. Now let us pray the Lord's prayer together:

Lord's Prayer: Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name. Thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread, and forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, the power, and the glory forever, Amen.
