



## **Worship Service Theme: Generosity**

### **Helpful elements:**

Green table covering (Ordinary Time)

**Welcome:** Welcome! It's so good to be together to celebrate faith and community today. My name is \_\_\_\_ and I'll be leading our worship time today. Our theme for today is **generosity**.

What does generosity mean to you and feel like to you? To me, it has a sense of abundance, like "generous portions," or over-the-top giving, when you're overwhelmed by a generous gift. We'll be looking today at what it means to be generous people, and especially God's generosity to us.

Please pray with me as we open our time together.

**Opening Prayer:** Great and loving God, we ask your to Holy Spirit bless our time together and to refresh us with your presence. In the midst of a world full of trouble and strife, we thank you for watching over us, guiding us, and as we confess our sins, for forgiving us. Enable us to enter your presence joyfully and reverently, and let us depart today with the assurance that our sins are forgiven. Fill us, O God, with the peace which passes understanding. Amen.

### **Opening Hymn: Doxology**

**Statement of Faith:** Let us affirm our statement of faith by reciting Psalm 23 together:

The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want.

<sup>2</sup> He maketh me to lie down in green pastures: he leadeth me beside the still waters.

<sup>3</sup> He restoreth my soul: he leadeth me in the paths of righteousness for his name's sake.

<sup>4</sup>Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil: for thou art with me; thy rod and thy staff they comfort me.

<sup>5</sup>Thou preparest a table before me in the presence of mine enemies: thou anointest my head with oil; my cup runneth over.

<sup>6</sup>Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life: and I will dwell in the house of the Lord forever.

**First reading:** 2 Corinthians 9:6-11

The apostle Paul, St. Paul, writes to the church at Corinth:

<sup>6</sup>The point is this: whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and whoever sows bountifully will also reap bountifully. <sup>7</sup>Each one must give as he has decided in his heart, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver.

<sup>8</sup>And God is able to make *all* grace abound to you, so that having *all* sufficiency [*literally: contentment*] in *all* things at *all* times, you may abound in every good work. ... <sup>10</sup>God, who supplies seed to the sower and bread for food, will supply and multiply your seed for sowing and increase the harvest of your righteousness.

<sup>11</sup>You will be enriched in every way to be generous in every way, which through us will produce thanksgiving to God.

This is the word of the Lord; thanks be to God.

**Second reading:** Mark 14:3-9

<sup>3</sup>And while Jesus was at Bethany in the house of Simon the leper, as he was reclining at table, a woman came with an alabaster flask of ointment of pure nard, very costly, and she broke the flask and poured it over Jesus's head. <sup>4</sup>There were some who said to themselves indignantly, "Why was the ointment wasted like that? <sup>5</sup>For this ointment could have been sold for more than three hundred denarii [a year's wages!] and given to the poor." And they scolded the woman.

<sup>6</sup>But Jesus said, “Leave her alone. Why do you trouble her? She has done a beautiful thing to me. <sup>7</sup>For you always have the poor with you, and whenever you want, you can do good for them. But you will not always have me. <sup>8</sup>She has done what she could; she has anointed my body beforehand for burial. <sup>9</sup>And truly, I say to you, wherever the gospel is proclaimed in the whole world, what she has done will be told in memory of her.”

This is the word of the Lord; thanks be to God.

**Interactive Homily:** Let’s think a little more about generosity.

- Tell me about someone who was generous to you at some point in your life. What did that person do? (for example, a teacher who spent extra time with you; a parent who helped you buy a house; a child who brought you flowers; someone who let you stay at their house while you were traveling)
- How did you feel when you received that person’s generosity?
- Now tell me about a time when you acted generously toward someone else: Why did you do it?

I love the two scriptures we read earlier; the first, when Paul tells the Corinthians, “You will be enriched in every way to be generous in every way...”

- When we want to be generous, who will give us what we need? God!
  - Not to hoard what we receive, but to give it freely

And the second story, of Jesus being anointed at Bethany: A woman pours a jar of *very* expensive perfume, possibly worth a year’s wages, over Jesus’ feet.

- Why are some people upset about this? How do they feel about the woman’s act of generosity?
  - Money “could have been given to the poor”
  - Seems like a waste
- But what does Jesus call her act? Why?
  - “A beautiful thing”
  - It’s what she has, and it’s what she can do right now. Jesus contrasts giving to the poor – which is good, and which people can always do –

with doing something NOW out of love, not waiting until some “better time.”

- Who enables us to be generous? GOD
- When we have an abundance, what should we do with it?
  - Share it! Give freely.
  - What sorts of things do we have that we can be generous with?
    - Time, money, listening, smiles, helping
  - Can you ever run out of something to give?
    - No! If we want to be generous, God will always provide
- Who is even more generous than we could ever be? GOD.
- In what ways has God been generous to you in your life?

Let’s take a moment to silently pray and reflect on the blessing and privilege of generosity.

**(Silent Prayer)** ... Lord, hear our prayers. Now let us pray the Lord’s prayer together:

**Lord’s Prayer:** Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name. Thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread, and forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, the power, and the glory forever, Amen.

### **Fourth Reading: A Story About Generosity<sup>1</sup>**

This is a true story from April 2017, reported on CBS News:

A random stranger who walked into a Texas ice cream shop is being called a legend after walking out of the store Saturday night with a 7-foot-long receipt, a bottle of water and a big smile on his face.

The man, identified as “Mr. Gary,” simply came into Sweet Sammies in Fort Worth, Texas, to buy a bottle of water.

But Mr. Gary decided to stick around, and one by one, as each customer entered, the man did something unexpected: he offered to pick up their tab.

For nearly three hours, Mr. Gary stood by the counter, greeting customers and offering to pay their bill. “He stood here all night and bought everyone’s ice cream until we closed,” [said the] shop owner. By the end of the night, Mr. Gary’s bill was \$1,300.

And [his] act of kindness didn’t stop there. Before leaving, Mr. Gary handed each worker a \$100 bill, a welcome surprise. What a beautiful example of unexpected, abundant generosity!
